Well, we hit the ground running and it does not seem to be slowing down. It actually seems to be speeding up. Here we are in February already. That wonderful, sweet, loving day we celebrate called Valentine's day is the 14<sup>th</sup> of February, and this year it is also the day we celebrate Ash Wednesday. From dust you came and to dust you shall return.

Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, falls on a different date each year. How is the date of Ash Wednesday determined? There are two factors that determine the date of Ash Wednesday. The first is the date of Easter. Easter Sunday is a moveable feast, which can occur as early as March 22 and as late as April 25. The second factor is the length of Lent. From the earliest days of the Church, Christians have desired to prepare for the celebration of Christ's Resurrection at Easter through a period of fasting and prayer that mirrors the 40 days that Christ spent in the desert at the beginning of His ministry. There was one little hitch because Sunday is the day of Christ's Resurrection. From the time of the Apostles, fasting has been forbidden on Sunday. No fasting on Sundays. So, while the Lenten fast is 40 days, Sundays are not included in the count, since they are days of feasting and not fasting. Therefore, in order to have a full 40 days of fasting before Easter, we have to count backward from Holy Saturday, while skipping every Sunday. When we do that, we find that we end up skipping six Sundays before we reach a count of 40 days, so Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, falls 46 days before Easter every year—40 days plus the six Sundays. While this may all sound rather complicated, the date of Ash Wednesday is actually easily calculated. Simply take the date of Easter for any given year and subtract 46 days.

Or, to make it even easier, count backward six weeks from the date of Easter to get the date of the First Sunday of Lent; Ash Wednesday is the Wednesday before the First Sunday of Lent. by Scott P. Richert Updated March 08, 2017 Here's the formula for determining the date of Easter. In A.D. 325, the Council of Nicaea set the date of Easter as the Sunday following the paschal full moon, which is the full moon that falls on or after the vernal (spring) equinox. In practice, that means that Easter is always the first Sunday after the first full moon that falls on or after March 21. Easter can occur as early as March 22 and as late as April 25, depending on when the paschal full moon occurs. What is the significance of the paschal full moon? The Council of Nicaea decided that Easter must always occur on a Sunday because Sunday was the day on which Christ rose from the dead. Why is the paschal full moon used to determine the date of Easter? The answer comes from the Jewish calendar. Passover fell on the date of the paschal full moon in the Jewish calendar, and the Last Supper (Holy Thursday) occurred on the Passover. Therefore, the very first Easter Sunday—the day on which Christ rose from the dead—was the Sunday after Passover. For calculation purposes, approximate dates are necessary. The paschal full moon can fall on different days in different time zones, which presents a problem when calculating the date of Easter. If people in different time zones were to calculate the date of Easter depending on when they observed the paschal full moon, that would mean that the date of Easter would be different depending on which time zone they lived in. For that reason, the church does not use the exact date of the paschal full moon but an approximation. For calculation purposes, the full moon is always set at the 14th day of the lunar month. (The lunar month begins with the new moon.) For the same reason, the church sets the date of the vernal equinox at March 21, even though the actual vernal equinox can occur on March 20. These two approximations allow the church to set a universal date for Easter, regardless of when you observe the paschal full moon in your time zone. by Scott P. Richert Updated April 05, 2017

February 4th	Fifth Sunday after Epiphany	green	Isaiah 40: 21-31 Psalm 147: 1-11, 20c 1 Corinthians 9: 16-23 Mark 1: 29-39	In Isaiah it is the one God who sits above the earth and numbers the stars—it is that God who strengthens the powerless. So in Jesus' healing work we see the hand of the creator God, lifting up the sick woman to health and service (diakonia). Like Simon's mother-in-law, we are lifted up to health and diakonia. Following Jesus, we strengthen the powerless; like Jesus, we seek to renew our own strength in quiet times of prayer.
February 11th	Transfiguration of Our Lord	white	2 Kings 2: 1-12 Psalm 50: 1-6 2 Corinthians 4: 3-6 Mark 9: 2-9	The Sundays after Epiphany began with Jesus' baptism and end with three disciples' vision of his transfiguration. In Mark's story of Jesus' baptism, apparently only Jesus sees the Spirit descending and hears the words from heaven. But now Jesus' three closest friends hear the same words naming him God's beloved son. As believers, Paul writes, we are enabled to see the God-light in Jesus' face, because the same God who created light in the first place has shone in our hearts to give us that vision. The light of God's glory in Jesus has enlightened us through baptism and shines in us also for others to see.
February 18th	First Sunday In Lent	purple	Genesis 9: 8-17 Psalm 25: 1-10 1 Peter 3: 18-22 Mark 1: 9-15	On Ash Wednesday the church began its journey toward baptismal immersion in the death and resurrection of Christ. This year, the Sundays in Lent lead us to focus on five covenants God makes in the Hebrew Scriptures and to use them as lenses through which to view baptism. First Peter connects the way God saved Noah's family in the flood with the way God saves us through the water of baptism. The baptismal covenant is made with us individually, but the new life we are given in baptism is for the sake of the whole world.
February 25th	Second Sunday In Lent	purple	Genesis 17: 1-7, 15-16 Psalm 22: 23-31 Romans 4: 13-25 Mark 8: 31-38	The second covenant in this year's Lenten readings is the one made with Abraham and Sarah: God's promise to make them the ancestors of many, with whom God will remain in everlasting covenant. Paul says this promise comes to all who share Abraham's faith in the God who brings life into being where there was no life. We receive this baptismal promise of resurrection life in faith. Sarah and Abraham receive new names as a sign of the covenant, and we too get new identities in baptism, as we put on Christ.

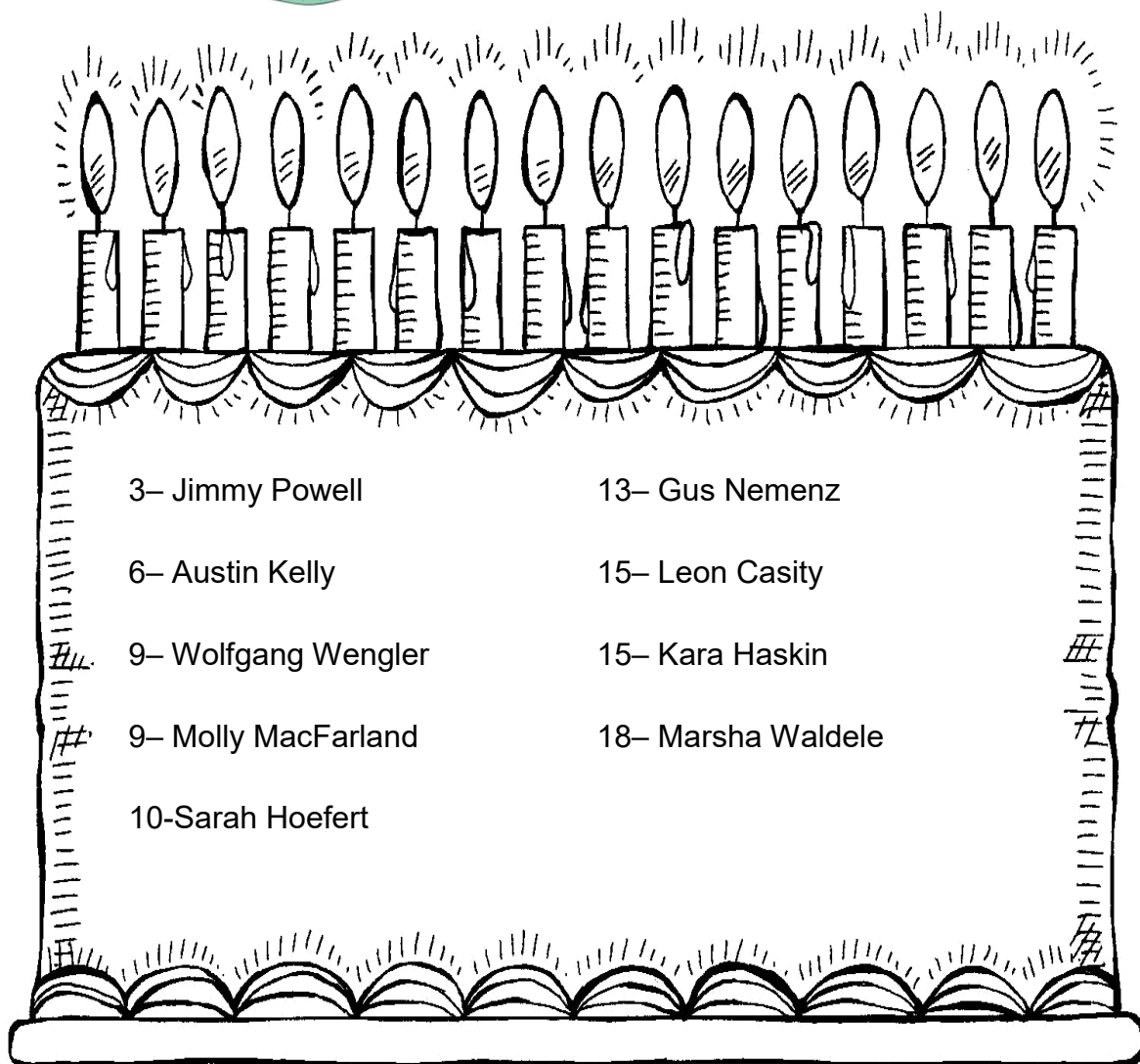

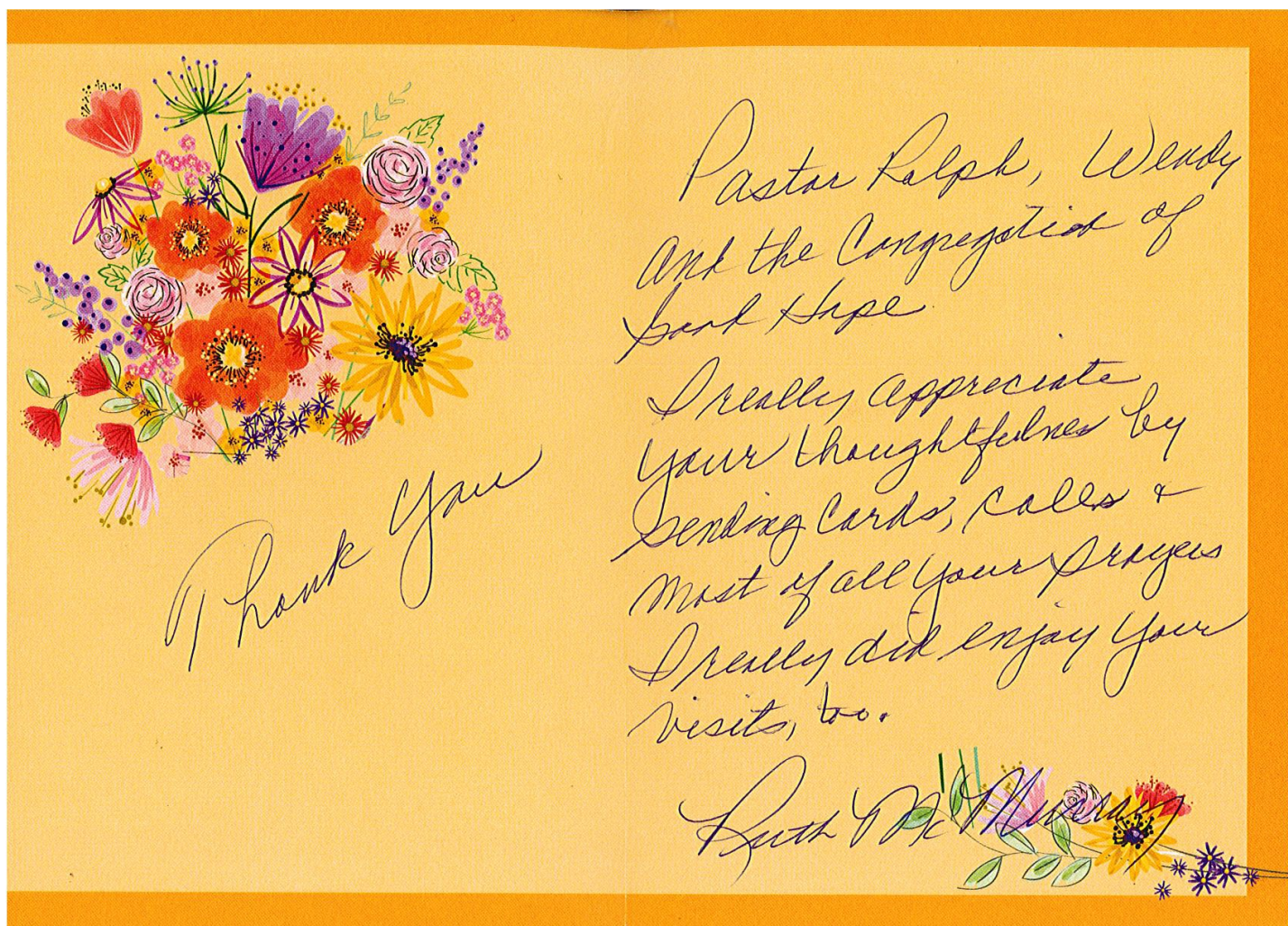
