Gathering Rite for All Saints

The festival of All Saints occurs just as the landscape in the Northern Hemisphere heralds the dying of plants and the quiet of winter rest. In like manner, the readings and liturgy of this day call us to rejoice in all the saints: those who have died and now rest in Christ, those who live now, and those yet to come.

As the church year draws to a close, we hear warnings about the end of time, stories of crisis and judgment, and parables of loss and death. The Christian community speaks honestly about human frailty and mortality. At the same time, we confess our faith in the risen Lord, in the communion of saints, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting. While both life and death may bring us fear and uncertainty, the liturgy calls us to hear the Lord's promise that he is with us in life and in death. Christ has claimed us in baptism and nourishes us in the communion of his body and blood. Christ leads us to the new Jerusalem. There we shall join all the saints in praise of God, who has turned our graves into the doorway to eternal life. (Sundays and Seasons Resources)

I live now in faith. What does that really mean? I can not remember a time when death scared me. Oh yes death has hurt me. It has shaken me to my core. I know that my redeemer lives and therefore death does not have the final say. I have hurt, but I have always had hope in the resurrection. I do not know what I would have ever done in my life without that faith or hope. My grandfather always pointed to his faith and hope and my father always talked about his faith and hope. It was never a discussion of the degrees of faith or the strength of faith. It was always a comment like, "Something will come along." "We had this happen before and we survived, we always get through." "We just do something else." I remember the last thing my grand father said before he lost all his mental abilities due to Alzheimer's. "Ralphie I am not sure about what happens next." Like a knee-jerk reaction, I said, "It is time to let Jesus carry us. Right?" And he replied, "I think so. I think so."

Why do I bring all this up?? Hebrew 11:1¹Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. We need to always be talking to all people about our faith or trust. ²⁸We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose. Romans 8:28. We have to cling to it will all we have or hope to have. God is right there and Christ is coming to carry you or take you to himself. The Holy Spirit helps you to put in to words what you need to pray and what you need to witness to those around you. You are not alone and ¹God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Psalm 46:1 We need to encourage one another. Some times the burden is more then we can bare so we need the help of others to remind us God is our fortress and our strength. ²The LORD is my rock, my fortress, and my deliverer, my God, my rock in whom I take refuge, my shield, and the horn of my salvation, my stronghold. Psalms 18:2

This is snippet of the Bishop's farewell letter to us all:

A little over four years ago, I was sitting with a group of bishops in a public relations seminar in Washington, D.C., in preparation for one of our ELCA Advocacy Convenings. The following day we would be meeting with legislators on Capitol Hill to seek their support for immigration reform and other human rights issues. In that seminar, the speaker emphasized the importance of regular communication with the people of our synod. It was essential to keep our people informed.

That seminar inspired me to begin this weekly effort as a way of staying in touch with you, the people of God in this corner of God's kingdom. And to use an old cliché, I have never looked back.

Now, more than 200 Musings later (212 by my count), I bring this weekly offering to a close.

My heart is filled with gratitude. I am thankful for so many things that if I were to list them all, "the world itself could not contain the books that would be written." Okay, I borrowed that last phrase from the Gospel according to John (Jn. 21;25), but I truly am grateful beyond measure.

I confess that these years have not been all joy. There were times of overwhelming frustration, despair, and loneliness; but in the final analysis, the joys far outweigh the challenges I've experienced in this ministry, and I leave with pleasant memories and a feeling of delight.

One of my anchor verses is found in Paul's first letter to the Thessalonians: "*Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.*" [1 Thessalonians 5:16-18]

I feel blessed to have been called to this office; to have been given the care of the pastors, deacons, and congregations of the Northeastern Ohio Synod for the past six-plus years; to have served as your bishop; and to have been given the privilege of communicating to you through this medium and in this fashion. It is truly one of the greatest earthly honors that God could have conferred on me.

My writing will resurface somewhere in some form or fashion. But for now, I say farewell and God's blessings.
