⁴⁷Very truly, I tell you, whoever believes has eternal life. 48 I am the bread of life. 49 Your ancestors ate the manna in the wilderness, and they died. ⁵⁰This is the bread that comes down from heaven, so that one may eat of it and not die. ⁵¹I am the living bread that came down from heaven. Whoever eats of this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give for the life of the world is my flesh." 52The Jews then disputed among themselves, saying, "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?" 53So Jesus said to them, "Very truly, I tell you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you have no life in you. ⁵⁴Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood have eternal life, and I will raise them up on the last day; 55 for my flesh is true food and my blood is true drink. ⁵⁶Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me, and I in them. ⁵⁷Just as the living Father sent me, and I live because of the Father, so whoever eats me will live because of me. ⁵⁸This is the bread that came down from heaven, not like that which your ancestors ate, and they died. But the one who eats this bread will live forever." ⁵⁹He said these things while he was teaching in the synagogue at Capernaum. ⁶⁰When many of his disciples heard it, they said, "This teaching is difficult; who can accept it?" ⁶¹But Jesus, being aware that his disciples were complaining about it, said to them, "Does this offend you? ⁶²Then what if you were to see the Son of Man ascending to where he was before? ⁶³It is the spirit that gives life; the flesh is useless. The words that I have spoken to you are spirit and life. ⁶⁴But among you there are some who do not believe." For Jesus knew from the first who were the ones that did not believe, and who was the one that would betray him. ⁶⁵And he said, "For this reason I have told you that no one can come to me unless it is granted by the Father." ⁶⁶Because of this many of his disciples turned back and no longer went about with him. ⁶⁷So Jesus asked the twelve, "Do you also wish to go away?" ⁶⁸Simon Peter answered him, "Lord, to whom can we go? You have the words of eternal life. ⁶⁹We have come to believe and know that you are the Holy One of God." (John 6: 47-69)

²¹Jesus, looking at him, loved him and said, "You lack one thing; go, sell what you own, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." ²²When he heard this, he was shocked and went away grieving, for he had many possessions. ²³Then Jesus looked around and said to his disciples, "How hard it will be for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God!" ²⁴And the disciples were perplexed at these words. But Jesus said to them again, "Children, how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! ²⁵It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God." (Mark 10:24-25)

²⁴Then Jesus told his disciples, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. 25For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it. 26For what will it profit them if they gain the whole world but forfeit their life? Or what will they give in return for their life? (Matt. 16:24-26)

The first chapter of John's gospel owes much to the biblical tradition that imagined Wisdom as existing before anything was created and having a role in the work of creation. Christ, the wisdom of God (1 Cor. 1:24), today invites us to eat his flesh and drink his blood. John's gospel includes no account of the institution of the Lord's supper, but here we can't help hearing Jesus' words as an invitation to the meal of bread and wine we share.
August 25th	14th Sunday after Pentecost	green	Joshua 24: 1-2a, 14-18 Psalm 34: 15-22 Ephesians 6: 10-20 John 6: 56-69	In today's gospel many people take offense at Jesus' invitation to eat his flesh and drink his blood; even many of Jesus' disciples peel off. This is the backdrop in John's gospel for Peter's confession of faith. "To whom can we go?" asks Peter, in words we sometimes sing just before the gospel is read. "You have the words of eternal life." In order to take such a stand, as Peter and Joshua did, Paul tells us to arm ourselves with the word of God. We pray in the Spirit that we might be bold ambassadors of the gospel.



A New Initiative: Isaiah 43

Whenever Pastor Ralph mentions things like the *Synod Assembly*, or even *The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America*, how many of you think to yourself: "the **WHAT**?" For that reason, as he and I talked on the ride home from the Synod Assembly in Akron last June, we agreed that it couldn't hurt to review some background on the subject and provide additional information on a new initiative.

The organizational structure of the ELCA is called a Synod. According to the ELCA website (elca.org): "Synods unite the work of congregations within their areas, serve as regional support, and guide pastoral and other staff candidates." The ELCA's 65 Synods vary greatly in size, geography, membership, staffing and program. The annual Synod Assembly is a prime example of Clergy and Laity gathering to support the work of member congregations.

On Sat., June 1, the Rev. Dr. Laura Barbins, Bishop of the ELCA, welcomed Clergy and Laity to the John S. Knight center in Akron to conduct the business of the **Northeast Ohio** Synod. Bishop Barbins highlighted the great diversity in the Lutheran World, emphasizing the work of <u>The Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land</u> (which includes Israel and the Palestinian territories). In addition to our presence in that region, the ELCA, in conjunction with the whole Evangelical Lutheran Church, and often in collaboration with the Lutheran World Federation -- walks side by side with Lutheran churches in 24 African countries as well as in Asia and the Pacific, Europe, Latin America and the Caribbean.

In addition, the ELCA supports seven seminaries and many other programs both here and abroad, providing financial aid to seminary students, Youth and Young Adult programs; and Camping Ministries. The ELCA is a lot bigger than you might think, and our reach goes well beyond the corner of Rt. 7 & 165 in North Lima.

Naturally, all of this requires money, and it wouldn't be a church meeting without at least *talking* about finances. In this case, Bishop Barbins pointed out that if more churches would pay a larger portion of their tithes to the Synod, the more funding would be available to support seminaries, spiritual needs, and clergy student loan support. She pointed out that the judicious use of **Time**, **Energy**, **Skills and Resources** is necessary for the ELCA to Succeed in supporting the Body of Christ – the church.

Following Barbins' presentation, Assistant to the Bishop, Rev. Jonathan Stufft, introduced a discussion of the need for the ELCA to adjust to the ever-shrinking pool of pastors available to draw from. Sadly, for a variety of reasons, fewer and fewer people enter seminary (Lutheran and otherwise) every year. As a result, in the ELCA there are currently **558 open churches** ready to begin the process of calling a pastor, but **just over 300 available pastors**.

Rev. Stufft said that the "Big C" Church – THE BODY OF CHRIST -- will remain, but that in order for local churches, individual congregations, to endure, it's going to require the increased involvement and participation of the members in the pews.

Since spring, Bishop Barbins and the Northeastern Ohio Synod Staff have been holding presentations on what they have named the **Isaiah 43** initiative. The Common English Bible translates **Isaiah 43** as "Look! I'm doing a new thing; now it sprouts up; don't you recognize it? I'm making a way in the desert, paths in the wilderness." Each **Isaiah 43** event included a brief presentation on the subject and was also heavily focused on conversations and brainstorming sessions as we think together about the future of Lutheran Christianity.

What became evident in these conversations is that the future is going to rely heavily on what Martin Luther refers to as "The Priesthood of All Believers." In other words, the people in the pews are going to have to step up, become involved, and participate in the life of not only their local congregation, but also in the congregations with whom we may be asked to collaborate.

Again, from the ELCA website: "We truly believe that God is up to something in Christ's church – that there is a reforming in the making. Our working hypothesis is that congregations are being called together in groups of 4-6 to be the Body of Christ together. These consortiums or collaboratives of congregations would have a shared mission and vision within their communities. They would be served by a staff of at least two pastors and potentially a deacon who would help shepherd the life of the consortium" and perhaps more important, "each congregation would maintain their own building and their own worship – and would be led at least in part by a trained lay minister who could effectively lead worship when one of the pastors or the deacon could not be present." Yes, there will be challenges to creating such a model, not the least of which would be geography, competition for attention, theological differences. etc. That said, please consider this: congregations in the new collaborative effort will also share expenses related to maintaining the new staffing model.

Now, before you decide ,**No Way**, that's the dumbest idea I've ever heard – please think about it. We've all survived school consolidations, corporate mergers, job transfers, and many other changes in our way of life, we can survive this too. Let me give you something to think about: due to the shortage of ordained ministers in the ELCA, the average wait time for the Call Process when a congregation is waiting for a new minister is *two years*, and even then, it is very likely you will end-up sharing a pastor with at least one another congregation.

Before retiring, I worked for over 26 years as an Administrative Assistant in an office of the United Methodist Church. I mention that now, because the UMC has been using a collaborative model similar to the ELCA proposal for many years, and I'm telling you that it can work! No, it's not ideal, but it sure beats the sad alternative of closing churches because there aren't enough ministers available to staff them or because they simply can no longer afford to pay a pastor or support a ministry. That said, it's not only the small, aging congregations that close once affluent, elderly members die off. Many times, it's also the lack of emphasis on doing God's work in their community that causes a church to cease to be viable. Couple this with the lack of new clergy coming into the system, and the Isaiah 43 model makes more sense all the time.

Stay tuned -- we'll be hearing a lot more about Isaiah 43 in the coming weeks and months.
